Minutes of Board Meeting

Minutes of the 19 May 2018 Officers' Teleconference

Proposed Agenda:

1. Updating the Well Fargo bank accounts. We need to make a formal decision by the board to remove unnecessary people from the accounts. We will also have to update the list of executives as Dave Skipton is the only one left. Another option is to wait until after elections later this year.

2. We need to get nominations for the best article of 2017 and the volunteer of the year.

3. We will discuss the membership meeting in September. Most important will be a program.

4. After-action report on WESTPEX and where do we go from here. Maybe we should have a presence at APS Show in Mesa (February 2019, Ameristamp Expo).

5. Elections for at least one new officer – vice-president. I need help here-I don't know enough people.

Additions proposed by Hyman Lovitz at the last moment:

6. Report on our trademark registration

7. Maintaining a formal corporate minutes and record book

Meeting notes:

In attendance: Mike, Ray, Hyman, Dave, Nik, Dave, Greg, Jeff, Alexander.

Agenda Item No 1. Mike updated the removal of herself and Clever's from Wells Fargo bank account. She visited a branch and was told that they will need the minutes of this meeting. There is a difference between the executive and a signer. It turned out that Steve is a signer, but is not an executive, and this is the problem.

Steve was not able to attend. He said there is only one way to get rid of unnecessary people: open a business account at another bank. Currently Chase offers \$300 just for opening a new business account. Closing the existing account will require the decision of the board.

Nik: \$300 is better than nothing, let's take a vote and move further.

Mike: we need a bank that covers all states, and we do not have Chase in Nevada (AK- this is incorrect: Chase is everywhere in Nevada, including Las Vegas and Reno).

Dave: I support closing Wells Fargo and moving to Chase.

Ray: motion: 1. Find out if we have the same conveniences and protection from an alternative bank. 2. If yes, we move account as discussed.

Vote: everyone for, one abstained (Mike).

Agenda No. 2. We need to elect "Article of distinction." Please send it personally to Alexander. "Volunteer of the year" – send nominations to Ray.

Agenda No. 3. Discussion who will attend BALPEX. Decided to make an email blast to members within about 100 miles from the show. Dave probably knows more people there, he mentioned several names. Discussion followed of the current location of banners. Potential exhibits discussed. Nik reminded about the new format of 2-3 frames.

Agenda No. 4. Greg reported about informal get-together of Rossica at Westpex. There were lots of “show and tell,” 12 people in attendance (6 members, 6 non-members), projector, and hospitality room. Short presentation was delivered by Ivo Steijn. Greg was able to sell some books. The meeting lasted 1.5 h. We received an invitation from WESTPEX for next year [supporting voices]. I propose organizing similar events at alternating locations, maybe two per year in addition to Rossica meetings.

Agenda No. 5. Election.

Our major concern is election of vice-president. Dave proposed John Myke with the condition that he should not attend formal meeting. AK: he is Canadian, will he be able to carry out financial duties? The answer is yes. The board can nominate the candidate.

Additional question submitted by Hyman: we need to keep a formal corporate book of meetings. Hyman insists. Greg proposes to convert the sound to text. An altercation ensued. Dave: Since I was in Rossica, we never had nor needed a corporate ledger as long as minutes of meetings were published in either journal or bulletin. Hyman: the decision to register trademark was voted on, but not published. Ray: it is not true. Alexander refused to take over any additional responsibility. No vote took place.

Trademark update. Hyman: The application was submitted 26 March to Trademark office, No. 87850046. Hyman was not aware of the abuse of the “Rossica” name. An explanation and a discussion followed. The discussion went in circles.

Ray: with the trademark, we can at least warn violators and spread information.

Meeting adjourned.

Money Letters to Mont Athos

There are many facets of collecting Russian Philately that still can be explored. Here is one in need to serious study and a possible exhibit.

There was a large Russian orthodox community at the Religious community of Mont Athos for centuries leading up to the Revolution. To help comfort the pious and sustain the monks located there, donations were sent to the monasteries from all over Russia. This appears to have been a well-organized operation. Most likely the Russian Orthodox Church provided the information needed to insure that the money made it to the Monks. The letters I have seen give detailed instructions on who to send it to and how to send it.

Per Trevel Pateman's article, all such mail was sent first to Odessa and from there to Constantinople, capital of the Ottoman Empire at that time. From there it was sent via the Turkish Post to Mont Athos which until 1913 was part of the Ottoman Empire. Starting in the 1890's, most of this mail was directed to the steamship Companies that were operating in the Black Sea. I have seen evidence of both the Austrian Lloyd Shipping Company and the Russian Company for Steam shipping and Trade (ROPiT). In 1891, the ROPiT opened a post office at Mont Athos.

Based on the covers I have seen, I believe that the ROPiT promoted their route and put out instructions to follow to insure that the letter traveled on their ships. There are even printed labels attached to envelopes to make it easier, most likely

added by the bank. See figure 1, which says in Russian and French:

The money letter was to be delivered by the Russian Post Office to Odessa and brought to the agent of the Russian Company (i.e. ROPIT). To be delivered to the hieromonk Kirill at Mt Athos.


I've also seen covers to Mt Athos hand stamped by the Austrian Lloyds line. There may be other shipping lines or routes that handled the mail as there were several competing shipping lines in the Black Sea at this time.

One can build a very interesting collection of money letters to Mt Athos showing the different

routes used. Lucky for us, the Monks sold the old envelopes to raise funds. One could even build an impressive one frame exhibit just of Russian Money Mail to Mount Athos.
